Parish Council

Since the Parish Election last May there have been quite a number of changes in the Parish Council. We started the year with 6 elected members, two of which unfortunately resigned during the year. The parish has welcomed and co-opted 6 Councillors since then and is now operating with 10 councillors, with all seats filled. In 2023 we also said good-bye to our long-standing Parish Clerk, Ms Welham, who has supported the parish in a number of roles over their 13 years as Clerk. Many thanks are given to Cllr Urbick who had the time and qualifications to be the Proper Officer of the Council whilst a new Clerk was sought and appointed. Mrs White was appointed as Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer in mid-February.

I want to take a moment to thank the outgoing Chair, Cllr Peirce for their service to the Parish Council over a number of years. Robin isn't leaving the Parish Council and continues to be the Community Centre Liaison and full voting member of the Council. Their long tenure on the Council, detailed knowledge of what has gone before and level-headed advice is invaluable to all of us on the Council and we are all grateful for Robin's continued service.

The Parish Council has committed to a number of "big projects" in the parish, including adding another Speed Indicator Display (SID) to our inventory of village traffic calming measures, and funding the replacement flat roof on the pavilion of the Village Hall on behalf of the village Hall Trustees. At the time of writing, the planning application had been submitted for a replacement Zinc roof, which we hope will last for many years ahead, and will be less susceptible to ball damage. Unfortunately, our hoped-for additional zebra-crossing cannot go ahead due to the restrictions of the topography of the current path and land ownership. The restoration of the Greenmore Ponds project is also proceeding with the commitment of several thousands of pounds toward this.

The Parish made a number of grants in the 2023-2024 financial year, including £6,500 to the Friends of Woodcote Primary School (FOWPS) toward their new playground roof for the Reception Class, £2575 toward the running costs of the Youth Club & £1000 to St Leonards for grounds maintenance. The library was also supported with a grant of £2100, and Village Hall was granted £9,000 with addition support of £12,400 toward maintenance of the building. Whilst we have a finite pot of monies which we can grant, we do welcome applications from local organisations, the form can be found on our website.

Parish Council projects during the 2023-2024 year included, £3420 for a SID, £28,500 on basketball court repairs and £3400 on play equipment repairs/installation. Combined Staffing Costs remain fairly fixed at approximately 20% of the precept, which is below the average for South Oxfordshire and I hope you feel this is giving the parish value for money as we do.

As the first tier of local government, our processes can seem quite bureaucratic and at times daunting. If you have any questions about how or why we are doing something in a particular way, please .

As we head into the 2nd Council year for the current electoral period, it is important for all to remember that each elected or co-opted member volunteers their time and seeks to do what is best for the whole community. At times it can be a very difficult job, with little reward, and I thank those on the Council with me this year for their time and efforts.

Financial Summary

The following table details the final, end of year accounts by budget code for the most recently completed Financial Year: 2023-2024, and the previous financial year for comparison.

The reserve account contains funds that have been earmarked for specific purposes. Whilst £380,500 is a significant amount to hold in reserve, the council is currently working toward an Operating Reserve at a level of the recommended 50% of precept, circa £65,000 plus saving for significant infrastructure projects, such as large renovation projects on the village hall, on behalf of the trustees, and capital expenditure on the play equipment areas. A large amount of the total reserve is Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) which the Council may only spend on specific sorts of projects.

NOTE: All figures to be considered draft, until accounts have been audited.

District Councillor Report – Woodcote & Rotherfield Ward

First year of a Second Term for the Liberal Democrat/Green Administration

In May 2023 the ruling administration at SODC was re-elected with an increased number of councillors; the partnership is now made up of 21 LibDems and 8 Greens. It was pleasing to see that, in the Woodcote & Rotherfield ward, voter turnout increased by 5%.

Cllr David Rouane continues as the Leader of the Council with Cllr Maggie Filipova-Rivers (LD) and Cllr Robin Bennett (G) sharing the role of Deputy Leader. The result vindicated the administration's focus on nature, climate change, affordable housing and community well-being over the previous four years.

A new draft council plan, entitled The Way Forward is now being consulted on, reinforcing the focus on financial stability, climate and nature and creating a fairer district with support for the most vulnerable and delivering more community, social and affordable housing.

This annual report highlights some of those achievements and explains how our strategic priorities are being translated into delivery by Council officers.

Affordable Housing and Infrastructure Delivery

The SODC Local Plan 2035 includes a policy which ensures that 40% of new housing developments of 10 or more units are affordable, with a variety of tenures included. In 2023/24 156 affordable home completions have been registered so far (with another quarter to go), and a new **Housing Delivery Strategy** adopted in November 2023 will enable SODC to build up its own stock of houses for social rent or to provide funding for third parties such as Community Land Trusts, Housing Associations and almshouse charities to deliver more homes. A small development on the Broadway in Didcot will be the first social housing built by the Council in over 25 years, and we have also been able to purchase over 20 houses with the help of a 40% grant from the Government as part of the Local Authority Housing Fund programme. A new **Empty Homes Policy** was adopted in March 2024 to enable the council's Housing Team to more actively engage with private owners to return properties to the rental market as our social housing waiting list grows.

Our housing team

During the past year we have allocated over £7m of CIL funding for infrastructure projects across the district, helping to mitigate the impact of new housing developments.

Joint Local Plan 2041

Over the past year the Planning Policy team has been working hard on the development of the new Joint Local Plan (covering both South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse districts), which will guide the kinds of new housing and jobs needed and where they should go, informing planning decisions for the districts. A key milestone for the JLP was the "Preferred Options" consultation held between 10 January and 26 February 2024, which was carried out both online and with in-person events and which attracted a very high number of submissions. Feedback from this consultation is now being processed and analysed, and the next stage will be a consultation on the draft Plan in the autumn of 2024. Having an up-to-date Local Plan is essential to avoid speculative planning applications and unwelcome proposals which do not align with our strategic vision, our housing need or our environmental aspirations for our district.

Key policy proposals include taking out some unsuitable strategic sites including Chalgrove and two sites in the Chilterns National Landscape at Nettlebed. Other important draft policies include much higher energy

efficiency standards for new homes, for biodiversity net gain and for the first time, a policy to protect dark skies and an ambitious policy to protect our waterways from sewage pollution from new developments.

Community Hub becomes permanent

The Community Hub was first set up during Lockdown to provide support for residents during the pandemic. Government funding ceased in 2023 but SODC committed to on-going funding for this important service, particularly as so many residents have been affected by the ongoing cost-of-living crisis. The Hub has now been made a permanent part of the Council's structure and will continue to offer advice and support on a wide range of issues including financial help, housing and homelessness concerns, Council Tax payments and Health and Wellbeing. The Active Communities team runs a variety of activities and programmes to help people recover from Covid-19 or to help families access free or low cost activities that provide physical and mental wellbeing opportunities.

SODC Grant Schemes including new CIL Grant Fund

Each year SODC provides capital and revenue grants to a wide range of voluntary and community organisations to support their on-going operations or to fund a one-off project or event. In the past year, we have provided Councillor Grant funding in this ward to projects that are in the ward or will benefit its residents. Our grants were heavily oversubscribed and so, difficult decisions had to be made. The projects we were able to support included:

- Nettlebed Parish Council for playground upgrades;
- Brazier's Park for an upgrade to their play area;
- Shedquarters, a local organisation aimed at tackling loneliness and isolation in our communities;
- Cruse Bereavement Support;
- Wallingford Rowing Club;
- Nettlebed Conservators for nature recovery projects.

The newly launched CIL Grant Fund is designed to provide much-needed infrastructure to support the growth of the district as a result of recent housing developments. It is the first time local organisations are able to bid for grant funding from SODC's share of the CIL receipts collected from house builders. At the time of writing, many Expressions of Interest have been registered and funds will be allocated later in 2024.

Our annual capital grants scheme saw large sums awarded to projects including the upgrade of the Mill Meadows playground in Henley, a Community Shop in South Stoke, the River and Rowing Museum for the refurbishment of their Ratty's Refuge outdoor education garden, a number of playground refurbishments across the district, a Girl Guide Hall refurbishment in Didcot, Scout Hall refurbishment at Goring Heath, and retrofitting and upgrading of community buildings at Sonning Common, Tetsworth and North Moreton.

Reducing our Carbon Emissions

As a Council we have a very ambitious target to achieve Net Zero in our own operations by 2025. Over the past year we have continued to decarbonise our leisure and arts centres by switching to non-fossil fuel heating systems, reducing the temperature of water in swimming pools, circulating warm air more efficiently and generally upgrading the fabric of the buildings. This has helped to reduce emissions considerably, but the largest source of emissions for us is our waste management service, which accounts for over 57% of SODC's total emissions. Decarbonising the entire waste fleet at a time when technology is still evolving and while we were waiting for clarity from the Government on future recycling requirements would have been

expensive and impractical, so we haven't been able to make the progress we would have liked. However, we have now agreed a 2-year extension with Biffa and are in the process of acquiring a new fleet of more efficient vehicles and a waste management strategy that will take us further forward towards reaching our goals. We also continue to collaborate with other authorities across Oxfordshire on the delivery of the "Pathways to a Zero Carbon Oxfordshire" action plan, which includes installing EV charging stations, retrofitting homes to make them more energy efficient, exploring Biodiversity Net Gain projects and renewable energy infrastructure. In the past year we also published a new Air Quality Action Plan to ensure that we continue to monitor air pollution in our towns.

Recycling Champions!

We were very excited to be announced as the country's **top recycling district** in DEFRA's latest tables! Initiatives such as our "Check it before you chuck it" promotional campaign in autumn 2023 demonstrate our commitment to maintaining this position. Thank you to our residents for their continued efforts to reuse and recycle.

Openness and Accountability

We are committed to transparency in the way we make decisions (almost all our public meetings are live-streamed and all papers are in the public domain at least a week in advance) and to reporting on our performance with honesty and accountability. Our quarterly performance reports are online at www.southoxon.gov.uk/corporateplan and our quarterly Climate Action Plan reports are also online at www.southoxon.gov.uk/climateaction.

Financial Stability

When we were first elected in 2019 one of our first priorities was to stabilise the finances of South Oxfordshire District Council, as they were in a poor state. The Council was having to draw on around £3m of reserves each year to plug the funding gap in its operating activities. Over the past few years, we have restored financial stability and for 2023/24 we approved a balanced budget with only a small (sustainable) draw on our reserves. With a large amount in reserves, we were fortunate to benefit from higher interest rates, but we also employed a specialist officer to seek external grant funding to supplement our own resources. This officer has paid for himself several times over by securing government funding for projects such as the decarbonisation of our leisure centres and to cover the increased running costs of our swimming pools. Withdrawing from expensive and inefficient outsourcing contracts has been a key priority, bringing services back in house to ensure better value for money and improved customer service for our residents. We have also increased fees and charges in some areas to ensure the council remains on a steady financial footing, while balancing these increases with the cost of living pressures our residents face.

SODC remains one of the lowest taxing districts in the country. The bulk of the council tax we collect is on behalf of the County Council and the Police.

Woodcote Fete

1. Membership

The current membership is 132. Over recent years this total has remained relatively stable at around this figure with new people joining to compensate for those that have moved on. At our last AGM it was decided to raise the membership subscription for the first time since the Group was formed in 2002 from £5 to £7 for family membership and from £3 to £5 for individual membership



2. Events

As with previous years the Group is holding various events during the year ranging for the regular (quarterly) Bird Walks and Working Parties in addition to a number of individual events such as this year's visit to a Rewilding Project in Nuffield scheduled for this coming June.

A series of bat monitoring sessions were held during May at the Greenmoor Ponds.

The most popular event held last year was the Fungus Foray in High Wood with over 30 people taking part.

Members also help organise and support the annual Toad Patrol at the Greenmoor Ponds.

3. Greenmoor Ponds

3.1. Upper Greenmoor Pond

Several working Parties including one team from Thames Water have spent time and some effort clearing crassula from this pond leaving a much larger area of open water.

3.2. Lower Greenmoor Pond

A subcommittee led by Rachel Sanderson was set up last autumn to initially investigate the cause of the leak in the lower Greenmoor Ponds and then decide on the best solution to rectify the problem.

Progress to date:

- a) Tree Survey carried out around the pond
- b) £1000 donation received from the Woodcote Rally Committee.
- c) Parish Council agreed to fund the remainder of the initial investigation costs.
- d) Willow and other vegetation around the edges of the pond cleared.
- e) Quotes to clear silt from the centre of the ponds obtained and the successful contractor selected and notified.
- f) Additional bore holes sunk around the pond to better understand the local hydrology and the current state of the water table.
- g) A waste exemption was applied for on behalf of the Parish Council to move silt around the site was received and is valid to 13th Jan 2027.

While the pond is holding some water it is currently unsafe to start moving silt from the centre of the pond. It is anticipated that the work will be carried out in July/August assuming the pond has dried out by then. Also by this date, the amphibian breeding season will have finished.

Woodcote

During the tree survey a dead ash tree was identified close by the Green Lane entrance to the site. As the tree, which is on Thames Water land, close to Long Toll and a power line both Thames Water and the Parish Council were informed. Thames Water has informed SSEB but as yet no action has been taken.

4. Tidmore Pool

Regular working parties have been held at the site to maintain the fences and hedges, look after the wild flower plot, and keep undergrowth around the pond under control.

5. WCG Allotment

The Group continues to look after this plot and regularly harvests hazel that is used for various purposes such as fencing at Tidmore Pool and pea sticks for gardeners and allotment holders.

6. Other Activities

Thanks go to residents who are doing their bit to for the local environment with supporting “No mow May”, providing bird feeders, hedgehog friendly gardens and helping with the Toad Patrol.

Finally thank you to the Parish Council for their tree planting programme and their general support to the Woodcote Conservation Group but particularly with regard to the Greenmoor Ponds.

Woodcote Community Centre

For the past 31 years, the Old Schoolhouse has been providing a small and welcoming venue for users and groups representing all ages, from Woodcote and surrounding villages.

This small and intimate facility complements the larger and well used Village Hall, and is managed by a dedicated group of Trustees – some of whom have been involved since the start of the project to convert this old schoolmaster's house into the thriving Community Centre it is today.

Over the past year, the extensive programme of painting and decorating has been completed, a new handrail installed along the staircase, and essential work undertaken to reduce the heat loss from this lovely old building.

The recent installation of superfast broadband has ensured that the building benefits from excellent internet connection in every room. This was a scheme offered through Oxfordshire County Council, with free installation and 3 years free running costs.

Our newly installed SmartLock and online booking system, managed by Louisa Devismes, has made the booking process for users much simpler, as well as reducing the burden on the committee.

The ever popular Saturday Coffee Shop has been welcomed back post Covid. Groups are now consistently raising between £200-£300 per session, and it is again becoming established as an important fundraiser for so many local groups, whilst also providing a lovely local venue for a coffee and piece of home made cake on a Saturday morning.

The Woodcote Volunteers are now fully settled in their room upstairs in the building, and we are delighted that the facility is working well for them.

Rynes Healthcare also hire 2 rooms upstairs, and their provision of much needed nursing and palliative care and home support, is providing essential services in Woodcote and the surrounding area, where little support was previously available.

The major plan for the coming year is to upgrade the kitchen, to ensure that the building continues to provide a high quality, up to date facility for our community.

None of this would be possible without the time and dedication of volunteers, so thanks must go to the committee for their continued support and hard work on behalf of the community.**2. Events**

As with previous years the Group is holding various events during the year ranging for the regular (quarterly) Bird Walks and Working Parties in addition to a number of individual events such as this year's visit to a Rewilding Project in Nuffield scheduled for this coming June.

Youth Club

It has been a challenging year for youth club. We lost our main youth club worker for the Junior club at the end of the summer term 2023. In an effort to keep that club running as well as the Senior club we have struggled with a lack of volunteers. We continued to run both Senior and Junior clubs for a while from the beginning of the September term with the help of our younger volunteers but when they started college and university courses it was impossible to continue in the same vein.

We took the decision a few months ago to run the Senior and Junior clubs on alternative weeks with the volunteer staff that we have. In our eyes it is not the ideal solution as there is a need for both clubs to run every week. We do have up to 25 to 30 young people attend each session, so the youth club facility is well used.

We have the advice and support of Oxfordshire Youth to call on and they are instrumental in running courses on mental health, health and safety, first aid, safeguarding and providing DBS certification to mention just a few of the important points.

It is not only some of the volunteers that are “of an age” but the 3 main committee members are also past retirement age, and we feel it is time for younger blood to come in and carry on this worthwhile project. The loss of the youth club would have a detrimental effect on the village and there is a definite need for it. We have advertised for volunteers but have drawn a blank. The committee would hate to see this valuable service falter but will endeavour to ensure the facility is there for the children.
